COURSE GOALS

- 1. **What happened?** To be familiar with Roman history and culture; to be able to contextualize it in a broader Mediterranean culture.
- 2. **How do we know?** To read Roman histories critically; to understand how an author's or a reader's perspective shapes one's understanding of history; to be able to read against a source.
- 3. What do we do about it? To participate in public history writing through contributions to Wikipedia; to connect this process back to Roman historiography.
